Why do we wear Shamrock?

It might surprise people to learn that St Patrick was born not in Ireland. Some claim he was born in Wales. Others say Scotland or Brittany. But we do know that he was an immigrant to Ireland, who, it is believed, came here as a slave. St Patrick felt a call from God to spread the message of Christianity in Ireland. To help people understand better the mystery of the Triune God (Three person in one God) he used a piece of shamrock with three leaves. One leaf representing the Father, the other leaf representing the Son and the third leaf representing the Holy Spirit. This is why we wear shamrock today as a sign of our belief in the most Holy Trinity who also is worthy of all our praise and thanksgiving.

Did vou know?

Hail Glorious St Patrick was written by Sister Mary Agnes McSweeney a native of Cobh. Born in 1823 she entered the Mercy Convent in Charleville in 1843 and in 1866 she and seven other Mercy Sisters went to Bathurst, Sydney. There they established schools in the new diocese of Bathurst. Her death was recorded in the Australian Press as the 'Death of a Pioneer Sister of Mercy' and she was referred to as the 'one of the oldest Sisters of Mercy in the world' when she died in 1905. The hymn appears to have been written at the beginning of the 1850s (c1853) and the nationalist reference to ever bless and defend the sweet land of our birth come just a few years after the Great Famine. The first reference to the hymn was about 1853 when it was published as No. 14 in Easy Hymns and attributed to Sr. Agnes, of the Convent of Charleville, Cork. In the convent archives there are a number of letters dating to 1854 when Rev. Leslie Bunn, Presbyterian Archbishop of York, and Hon. President to the Hymn Society of Great Britain and Ireland requested biographical data on Sr. Agnes, author of the Hymn Hail Glorious St. Patrick. He wanted to include it in an updated edition of a dictionary of Hymns. The historical documents in Australia make reference to her proficiency in French and English Literature that she had a great interest in ancient and ecclesiastical history but no reference to her interest in music.
